


The real heroes of the Christian life are those who quietly, humbly, without publicity, follow Christ in their daily lives and make a difference in the lives of others. That's been true for 2000 years. I think we all want to follow "the way of Christ" more closely and live it out with others, inside and outside the church. That's what it means to be a disciple. Unlike celebrities we don't get fame or fortune for doing that. That's why such people are called "unsung heroes". But they are building the Kingdom of God.

How can we grow disciples here? Partly through worship and the Bible studies we offer - they impart knowledge about God and as participants discuss what's taught we learn more about how He wants us to see the world and live in it.

But there are opportunities to be together outside of classes or Sunday mornings, real world ways for us to be together. The model Covid pushed us into - people watching alone or with their family from home - was necessary for a time and is convenient, but it's not the best way to strengthen the Church or add people to it. I know some of you are super-busy and for you this - and reading - are all you can do now. That's understandable. But for those less busy there are other ways.

We hold monthly lunches at church and the Men will meet for breakfast on the 24th. 6-8 women do Crafts weekly. The Praise Team and Choir build relationships. So does the Sound team. Some go to lunch with others after worship. A few regularly invite newer people over to their homes for a meal. Some women pray together online each Thursday afternoon. A few guys even went to a rock concert. These are great! They allow us to learn about others, deepen friendships and some of them take "church" outside the 4 walls where others can see us, and we can see what's happening with them.

Could we form other walking groups? Hold an acoustic guitar sing-a-long some evening? A Patriots game watch party? Form a group to gather items needed by recently settled refugees up in Manchester? A work day to help the Haitian Baptist Church in Manchester? Another young adult Game Night? Get on Zoom with our pets and "show and tell" with other pet owners? We're open to your ideas.

Biblical examples of good marriages, researched and compiled by Richard Cardner (married to Linda for 56 years).

Ruth and Boaz (found in the Old Testament book of Ruth)

Even before Boaz fell in love with Ruth, when she first came to work for him, he took care to protect her and provide for her (Ruth 2: 8-9). He also complimented her for caring for her mother-in-law. The book highlights strong inter-generational relationships, also helpful for healthy marriages.

Boaz showed integrity by following Jewish law and helping restore Naomi's property to her and Ruth, even though it cost him significantly. (Ruth 4:1-12)

Ruth and Boaz' child, Obed, became the ancestor of both King David and Jesus.

Elkanah and Hannah (found in 1 Samuel)

Hannah at first could not have children and Elkanah was sensitive to the hurt that caused her, and entered into it. "Why do you weep? Am I not better to you than 10 sons?"

They helped each other religiously. Hannah went from anguish in not having a child to contentedly giving to God a son she did not even have yet, and again Elkanah supported her. I Samuel 1:21-23

Mary and Joseph (Luke 1, 2)

Jesus' earthly parents maintained their commitment to each other to marry in spite of attacks by others. They traveled together to Joseph's ancestral home even though Mary was pregnant, a sign of being willing to suffer to do what had to be done. And they took Jesus to the temple when he was a boy, an example of raising children up to know the Lord.

What can be learned from this brief inquiry? Seek God's will. Trust and be trustworthy. Work with the extended family. Connect with your religious organization.


The Missions Cmte gave a special gift to the children's ministry in Romania that Jane Hill traveled to a few years ago and received a nice Thank You note.

Haitian Baptist Church in Manchester - one of many hurt by Covid. They have a serious heating problem because of stained glass windows that are poorly insulated. They still owe \$3,000 from last winter's bill. We are working with the ABC office to get plastic sheeting put up over the windows.







In August I attended a Pastor's Day at a Joni and Friends Special Needs Family Camp in Greenfield, NH. There were 20 families there with at least 1 child or adult with a disability and they hold 3 of these camps each summer. There were many volunteers of all ages there. Most of them cared for the kids, giving parents and siblings a much needed break, and others taught Bible lessons, or lead music, games or crafts. All told there were about 100 people there.

The man who gave the devotional to the parents said something beautiful: these young people who are disabled will be made whole one day at the Resurrection. Therefore to love and care for them now shows people in the world the hope that is in the gospel, that God will make all things beautiful in His time. It's in this way that the weaker among us really are indispensable, because they give the rest of us the chance to show that we believe. Let's all look for opportunities to show God's goodness in the way we

care for the less fortunate.
